



SMALL & LARGE DELEGATIONS AWARDS ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

Numbers

Small Delegation: at most 10 delegates

Large Delegation: 11+ delegates

Calculations

(Applicable to both Small and Large Delegations)

The Delegation Awards are determined through a standardized calculation method designed to ensure proportional fairness while also recognizing institutional contribution through leadership representation.

I. Base Score – Individual Awards Percentage

The primary component of the delegation score is the percentage of delegates from a given school who receive individual committee awards.

The calculation is made as follows:

$(\text{Number of awarded delegates}) \div (\text{Total number of delegates in the delegation}) \times 100$

This proportional method ensures that smaller delegations are not disadvantaged solely due to size and that overall performance quality is prioritized over absolute numbers.

Example:

- School A: 5 delegates, 5 awarded → 100%
- School B: 9 delegates, 6 awarded → 66%

In this scenario, School A ranks higher, as a greater proportion of its delegation received awards.

II. Leadership Positions – Institutional Impact Weight

In addition to individual performance, BRAMUN recognizes institutional contribution through official leadership positions. Each leadership position held by a student from the delegation adds **10 percentage points** to the delegation's final score. These positions are weighted separately because they represent institutional engagement and impact beyond individual committee performance.

Example:

- School A: 80% (awards) + 1 leadership position
Final Score: $80\% + 10\% = 90\%$
- School B: 75% (awards) + 2 leadership positions
Final Score: $75\% + 20\% = 95\%$

In this case, School B ranks higher due to greater leadership representation.

III. Additional Provisions

1. Awards obtained in double delegations count as one award total for calculation purposes.
2. To be eligible for a Delegation Award, a school must receive at least one committee award.
3. Leadership positions alone do not qualify a delegation for a Delegation Award.
